Headteacher's Message

Dear Parents, Carers and Students,

Pope Francis compared the journey of Lent to a “strenuous mountain trek”. He asked us while we hike up the mountain, to not only keep our eyes on the path before us, but to know that when we reach the top, we are rewarded by the beautiful panorama in front of us. Since the start of this academic year, each member of our Learning Family has been hiking up a mountain; this has required effort, sacrifice, and concentration.

The rewards experienced individually and as school have been so worth the effort. To see our students develop as people and learners continues to be a privilege for me, to work with colleagues who continually adopt a solution driven approach is, for me, a source of daily inspiration.

As the end of the term approaches, and we reflect on the meaning of Lent, we consider the Easter story:

“Knowing that everything had now been finished, and so that Scripture would be fulfilled... Jesus said, ‘It is finished.’ With that, he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.” (John 19: 28-30)

Christians believe that on Easter Sunday, Jesus rose again from the dead. He came back to life, defying expectations. We also believe that in this event good overcame evil, life is stronger than death and that light shines through the darkness. And that’s the challenge for us all – life undoubtedly has its challenges for each and every one of us, but with a belief that the darkness can and will be overcome by light then we can tackle those challenges head on and overcome them. For St. Anne’s Catholic High School for Girls, Jesus is our guiding light, and teaches us the way that we should live out our lives.

This is no more important a message than now. In our world we see inexcusable acts of violence, none more so than the events in Ukraine. There are, however, so many other conflicts around the globe which do not always receive the same amount of coverage. For those affected by any conflict in our world, we offer up a prayer for peace:

CAFOD Prayer – The Gift of Peace

May God give wisdom and courage to those who work for peace.

We pray that their efforts may be blessed, that they may bring an end to violence and solace and stability to suffering peoples.

May the gift of peace permeate all troubled souls, convert all who live by violence and comfort all children who live in menacing situations, that the freedom to enjoy life and grow in safety may be theirs.


And may each one of us know peace of mind and heart, peace of body and spirit, peace of community and world.

During the End of the Spring Term Masses, eight Sixth Form students were commissioned as Eucharistic Ministers. It brought us great joy to be able to witness this and we ask everyone to pray for them as they start their special ministry.

Soup & Roll Lenten Appeal



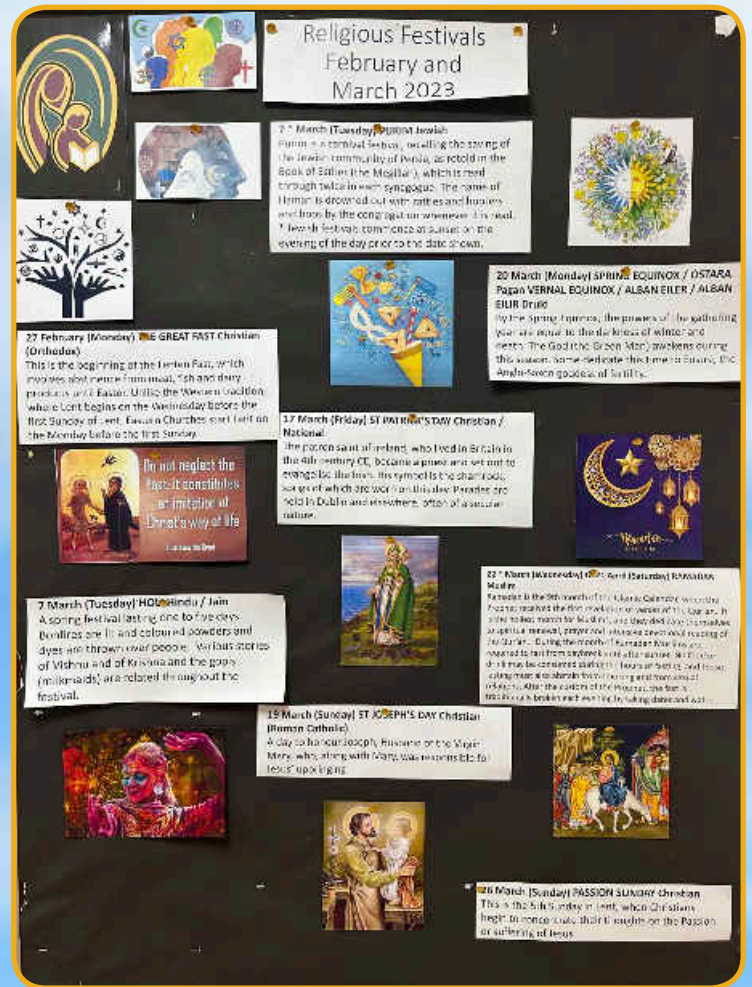
This year's Lent campaign was in favour of a Catholic Charity based in our diocese that helps and supports thousands of children in need, the 'Catholic Children Society'.

Religious Diversity



This month we celebrated several religious festivals including the beginning of Lent, Holi, Purim, Ramadan and many more.

During form time this month we chose to focus on Holi and Ramadan in order for students to have a better understanding of different faiths and their peers, some of which would be celebrating these festivals. Evocative and profound, the Stations of the Cross are a powerful way of contemplating Jesus' final hours before his crucifixion. Echoing the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem and Jesus' route to Mount Calvary, the stations take on added significance during Lent and, in particular, on Good Friday.

Year 8 students have been studying Lent and Easter and we were delighted to be able to gather in the Holy Family Convent's chapel, right next to our Lower Site school, to keep this well-established tradition of praying the stations during Lent. Particular thanks to Sister Daniella and Sister Miriam who welcomed us and gave us a talk about the links between the Holy Family sisters and St. Anne's. We are very grateful to the sisters for their hospitality and for enabling us to have this special experience.

Creating opportunities for people my age gives them a sense of purpose and in a lot of ways, that keeps them safe. So I thank you for the experience."

Disneyland Paris



On 26th February, thirty St. Anne's students embarked on a journey of a lifetime to attend a Computing conference at Disneyland Paris. We set off from King's Cross St. Pancras, taking the Eurostar to Marne-la-Vallée. We arrived in France in wet weather, but it didn't dampen our excitement. We stayed at Hotel Grand Magic, inviting us to live a unique immersive experience. The rest of the day was then spent in Disneyland Park on rides, stocking up on sugar and watching the breathtaking firework display (even though it was a bit cold).

The next day was an early start but luckily, we had a buffet breakfast to supply us all with the energy needed for another action-packed day. We started by attending Computing Live, at which we listened to talks on programming, coding and cyber-security and discussed the impact of emerging technologies. There were guest speakers including Rik Ferguson, a cyber-security expert, Suzie Imber, an associate professor of Planetary Science at the University of Leicester, and the highlight of the day was Lady Marieme Jamme, who is an award-winning Technologist and pioneer in system change, a Young Global Leader of the World Economic Forum. Three of our students asked questions at the end of the conference and we finished off by getting a photo with Lady Marieme Jamme.

We filled the rest of the day by meeting as many Disney characters as possible, observing the magnificent Disney parade and singing *Let It Go* in French with illuminations brightening the sky. We capped off a great day by having a group dinner with lots of savoury and sweet treats.

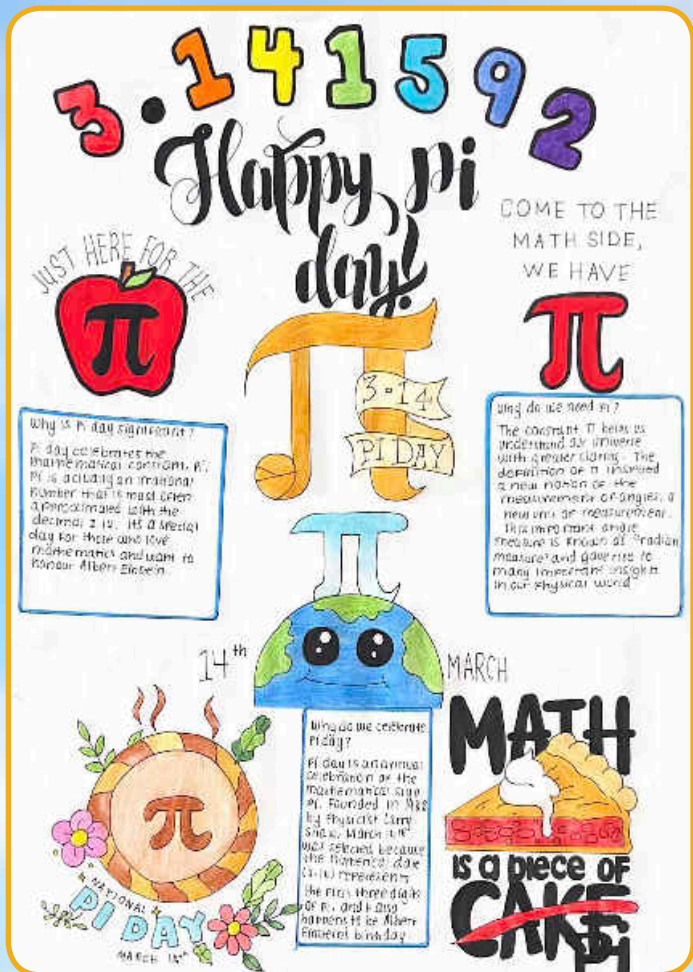
