I Symbols of Christmas I

HISTORY
The Germans believed that the world was held in the branches of a tree called "Yggdrasil". Each winter solstice, they worshipped the tree by decorating it with torches.

CHRISTIAN ORIGINS
It is said that St. Boniface knocked down the tree and planted a pine, symbol of God's everlasting love. He decorated it with apples (sin) and candies (the light of Christ).

THE CHRISTMAS TREE

EXPANSION
This tradition spread throughout Europe in the Middle Ages and, with the conquests and migration, arrived to America. Gradually, this tradition evolved.

NOWADAYS
Apples were replaced by spheres and the candies by lights, which represent the joy and light that Jesus brought to the world.

ORIGINS
The first missionaries in Europe took advantage of the pagan traditions to evangelize. One of them consisted of lighting candles during the winter, which represented the sun god.

CIRCULAR SHAPE
It represents God's eternal love for us and also speaks of our own love towards the Lord and others, which needs to be renewed constantly.

THE ADVENT WREATH

THE BRANCHES
Green is the color of hope and life. Our biggest hope should be to achieve a closer union with God in the tree and its branches.

THE CANDLES
The four candles of the wreath are lit each Sunday of Advent. They represent the dissipation of darkness as we approach the birth of the Lord.

HISTORY
According to tradition, St. Francis of Assisi was the initiator of living nativity scenes. The practice became popular and later on, figures were used instead of people and animals.

THE FIRST MANGER
It is said that the first nativity scene was built in Naples, Italy in the late fifteenth century and was made of clay figures.

THE MANGER OR NATIVITY SCENE

EXPANSION
Charles III ordered the manglers to be spread throughout the Spanish and Italian kingdoms. The Franciscan friars carried this tradition to America.

NOWADAYS
The figures of a nativity scene can be of different sizes (even real size) and they represent the different scenes of the birth of Baby Jesus.

KS3 Book Club



This term the students involved have been reading in two groups, with one reading 'Wonder' by R.J. Palacio and the other reading 'Ghost' by Jason Reynolds.

I can't wait to hear all they've read over the Christmas holidays.





Stuart Lawrence Book Launch

On November 17th, St. Anne's was honoured to receive a visit from Stuart Lawrence, the brother of Stephen Lawrence, whose murder impacted the legal and social landscape of this country. This visit was organised as part of a wider borough campaign, 'No Privilege, Just Words', a reading campaign created by Alfie Egembah, a teacher for more than 10 years and supported by Nexus Enfield. The campaign grew in response to recent global events and the Black Lives Matter movement. Through it, Mr Egembah aims to educate the next generation to change the way they view matters regarding race and racism.

One of the books at the heart of the campaign is that of Stuart Lawrence. Following on from his family's work to find justice for Stephen, Stuart has committed his life to improving the prospects of young people – as a teacher, inspirational speaker and most lately, an author. His book 'Silence Is Not An Option' is popular in the school library, with students already keen readers of its wisdom and insight. Stuart brought some of these ideas to an all-KS4 assembly, a thoroughly engaging event that captured the imaginations of the girls. They had been preparing carefully in English lessons, learning about the background to Stuart's story and discussing the issues raised by his brother's murder.

Twenty students were selected to attend a Q&A with Stuart and were delighted to be able to probe him further about these ideas. The questions asked were insightful and really showed the intelligence and social awareness of the students here. The inspirational message that Stuart brought touched staff and students alike at the school and we all eagerly await the day he is able to return.


Routes into Higher Education and Employment - A Parents' Guide



Routes into employment

There are many routes into employment for your daughter. The traditional university route is great for most, as it offers in-depth study and depending on the course she chooses, can be more open or narrow. Many employers look for degrees. FYI just because they do a STEM based degree, it doesn't mean they will have to do a STEM based career, for example I know people to have done Biology or Chemistry at university and have gone into something like sports journalism. A STEM qualification has many transferrable skills that all sorts of employers value! Your degree doesn't have to determine your career.

Another route to employment is through apprenticeships. There are different types. But after 6th form they can do a degree apprenticeship. They study for a bona fide degree for free. Because this is an apprenticeship scheme, they'll also be working for an employer, the degree apprenticeship provider, and earning a salary. You also get experience, which is vital in a STEM career. If they're interested in a STEM career, a degree apprenticeship could be a great option for them. To find out more about degrees or degree apprenticeships go to UCAS.com



Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) Guide for parents of GCSE and A level Students

Is my daughter doing GCSE's or A level?

GCSE → **What tier is my daughter doing for GCSE STEM?**

- Foundation** → **STEM A-level or equivalent options**

Option 1 Provided she gets a 4-4 in combined science she can do Health and Social Care BTEC, or 3 grades at 9-4 incl. English for IT BTEC or for psychology A-Level, 5 grades 9-5 including English and Maths
- Higher** → **STEM A-level or equivalent options**

Option 2 Provided she gets a combined science grade of 7-6 or above and a grade 7 in maths GCSE, she can do any of the STEM A-level subjects incl. Biology, Physics, Chemistry and Maths.

A level → **Based on her GCSE grades she will either be in option 1 or option 2**

- Option 1: BTECs or a mixture of BTECs and A level**

With option 1, This is a more vocational route with lots of options available for further study, including level 5-7 (Degree level) Apprenticeships which are paid training opportunities and also lots of university courses she can apply for e.g. forensic science. Go to the UCAS website for more information on these and similar courses.
- Option 2: purely A-levels**

With option 2 she has a little more choice. Provided she gets the required grades, she can choose from most degree courses or apprenticeships in STEM. See UCAS website for more information.



A Message to Parents, Carers and, of course, my wonderful students past and present





Revision Hints and Tips from Mrs Khan

Hi all, my name is Mrs Khan and I'm the KS3 Science lead at St Anne's. I have been working on revision techniques for KS3, not just in Science but also in other departments. The whole school has pushed independent learning and study skills at all key stages. Miss Sehested has done a lot of work with study groups and boost my grade sessions at KS4 too. The aim is to give your daughter/s the tools she/they need to be able to be independent learners who take ownership of their study and ultimately succeed. Here are some general hints and tips you could do to encourage your daughter when it comes to studying and revising:

1. Take an interest in their homework or study. Ask them questions about it.
2. Encourage them to revise when they have upcoming assessments, but also when they don't, studying is just as important as revision and can be done right from the beginning.
3. When they're studying/revising they should have a quiet place away from distractions, e.g. the TV and their mobile phones.
4. Encourage them to take an interest in their favourite subjects outside of class, e.g. going to a museum or gallery or watching documentaries.
5. Make sure they have the Microsoft Teams App on an accessible device such as a mobile phone or computer, as there is so much work and resources placed on there for them.




First Aid Training with the British Red Cross
