Lunchtime Chapel Services


Every week, at lunchtime, students from all Year groups can come to the chapel to pray together and to attend Bible study sessions. During May, we focused our prayers to Mary.

IT Exchange

IT Exchange is a long-standing community project with local charity partner, Generation Exchange. Year 12 volunteers are recruited and trained to deliver one-to-one IT support to local older people. The ten-week course saw a group of 17 Year 12 volunteers and 14 older learners take part every Tuesday, and the library was a hub of activity with lots of learning, laughter and tea during the hour and a half of the course. 100% of the older learners completed evaluation forms and said they would recommend the project to others. One of the learners summed up the project and the help received beautifully: "I have been very impressed by the courtesy shown to me, not only by the students teaching me, but also by the manners and respect shown when I have walked down the corridors. Well done, St. Anne's."

One of Year 12 volunteers told us: "It has been a great, wonderful experience. I would absolutely recommend it to others. It has enriched my knowledge on the older generation and given me the chance to practice teaching skills."

Thank you to all the Year 12s for your support and commitment and to the Year 10s too - we hope you enjoyed your volunteering experience and look forward to welcoming the project back next year with the new Year 12s.


What Our Students Achieved:

Due to the high number of girls we have playing tennis at the school, this year we entered four teams (three in the Year 7/8 category and one in the Year 9/10 category). We had some outstanding results this year, with one of our Year 7/8 teams winning two matches from three in their league which is a brilliant achievement. Sociology Trip to the V & A and Harrods





On 11th July, the Year 12 Sociologists set off on a sunny day (for a change!) to South Kensington. The aims of the trip were: to become more aware of the value of objects and their place in shaping and representing society; to feel more familiar with one of the most beautiful museums in London; to reflect on what it means to build (literally) a nation through its buildings by visiting the Tropical Modernism exhibition; to 'see' how a materialistic consumeristic culture plays out in a store like Harrods. And, of course, to create more 'group solidarity' especially as we are about to enter Year 13. Here is our first picture next to a war memorial to the people forcibly repatriated to Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union after World War II. It is called 'The 12 Responses to Tragedy" by Angela Connor.

The V & A was stunning to all of us, represented instantly by the Chihuly chandelier in the foyer seen to the right.

We walked through the rooms representing the Britain of 1500-1760, admiring the furniture and silver, including a huge four-poster bed. We then visited the cast courts to see how replicas of many famous ancient monuments have been recreated to allow visitors in the UK to appreciate



them without having to travel to Athens or Rome. After that the class split into smaller groups and they could choose which sections to focus on. Some chose to go to the jewellery rooms whilst others looked at the South Asian and Korean sections. They were all given a 'challenge' to take a picture of an item they particularly like, which will be turned into a postcard.





We then had our lunch in the courtyard with warm sunshine and enjoying a rare 'summer feeling' as some children paddled in the large, oval pond. We ate my margarita and potato pizzas. After that we had a timed entry to the Tropical Modernism exhibition. We found out how the architecture of modernism was applied to tropical locations like Ghana and India in the 1960s in new school and community buildings to encourage 'development' in a global sense whilst also respecting local tradition and culture.

After that we took a lovely walk through the pretty mews roads behind the museum ending just before Harrods. The students spent 45 minutes here in various departments such as food and fashion. When I asked them how they felt after this, they said, "Poor"! Definitely a motivation to do well in our studies now. Some of them bought the Truffle Mac and Cheese Box which they had seen trending online – and it was delicious!
